A wide variety of entry-level positions as well as positions that require the knowledge and skills needed to plan and lead activity and recreation programs in assisted living residences, nursing care facilities, or in client homes as an independent contractor. Positions are available in state and local government agencies, non-profit organizations, institutions, and private sector businesses that provide older people and adults with disabilities, with information and referral services, service coordination. employment counseling, legal services, activity and recreation programs, health education programs, housing, medical care, and in-home support services.

# Honors Courses (H):
